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## School District 2004-2005 Budget

At their meeting on Monday, April 12, the Central Lyon Board of Education approved the school district budget for 2004-2005. This budget will provide no “new money” due to our continuing decline in enrollment and the effect this loss has on the budget formula calculation. Consequently, our general fund spending authority is no greater than it was five years ago. Because of this spending limitation, it has been necessary for the district to meet the demands of increasing costs by making cuts in services. These cuts, which have been made

across the budget, include staffing, supplies, equipment, maintenance, and transportation. The district has attempted to avoid the loss of essential instructional programs and will continue to hold to this practice as long as our limited resources allow.

Many Iowa school districts are dealing with similar budget problems resulting from declining enrollment and low allowable growth provided by the Iowa Legislature. It is essential that the Iowa Legislature backs its stated high priority of public schools with the necessary resources to allow Iowa schools to maintain their top standing in the nation.

## CL Activity Center, Historical Plaza Progresses

It is expected that the construction of the new and remodeled building at the north end of the school campus will be completed by mid-May. It is also planned that some or all of the adjacent Historical Plaza will be completed by mid-June. To commemorate both projects, a dedication program and open house is scheduled for Saturday, June 19, 2004 at 3:30 p.m. at the site of the new construction. If weather allows, the dedication will be held outside on the school lawn. The program of events is part of the Heritage Days celebration, and the public is invited.

The building to be dedicated is designed to support the remodeled gymnasium, weight room, and fitness center that remain following the removal

of the former high school. The new structure includes public restrooms, locker rooms, and a “common” room to be used for a wide range of school, community, and other events. In addition, new street and parking areas will be provided.

The Historical Plaza, located on the same site, is meant to represent the history of the former high school and the school district. It has been partially financed by the sale of engraved bricks, granite pavers, and granite benches purchased by supporters of the school district. It will feature the existing flagpole dedicated to the class of 1924 as well as limestone urns and

interpretive plaques saved from the former high school. The entrance to the plaza will feature an archway constructed from the limestone door surrounds of the former high school. The flagpole and entire area will be illuminated by a new lighting system.

## Iowa AEA Online Training for Parents

Iowa Area Education Agencies are providing five online resources to all Iowa accredited schools. The Iowa AEA Online Resources have been available to AEA 4's students and teachers since the beginning of the current school year and will be available for the next two school years as well. Available 24/7 at both school and home to students with Internet access, the online resources give teachers and students access to a wealth of information for assignments, research, and personal interest. The online resources include **Atomic Learning**, which is an electronic help desk and training system for your computer applications. **Clipart.com School edition** is a collection of over 2.5 million searchable clipart, photos, images, fonts and sounds. **Ebsco** provides full-text periodicals, newspapers and reference tools for students. **Multimedia Archives** is a database of Associated Press Archives, which allows access to AP stories, photos, graphics and sounds. **World Book Online Reference Center** includes all the articles from the 22 volume print set plus additional articles, videos and animations, sounds, and linked web sites. When accessing these online databases, students use information skills such as finding, evaluating and using information; technology skills; and literacy skills in reading, analysis, and problem solving.

To best utilize these resources, students need to understand the type of information available and now how to use the databases. AEA 4 has put forth a concerted effort to provide the necessary training to help educators make the most of these resources in their classrooms. However, since not all learning and classroom assignments are completed at school, parents or other family members may also be interested in learning how to use the online resources in order to better help their children.

To address this need, four evening workshops will be offered to parents/guardians at four different sites in AEA 4 this spring. Parents may participate at any of the four locations. - Jubilee donates supplies and assists programs.
- Community members hold mock interviews and serve on panels during May term.
- A community advisory group give input on the vocational program and Hall-of-Pride creation .
- G&D Baitshop has annually donated the 5th grade aquatic life and food for a fresh water pond.
- DGR conducts a tour of the facility after calculus and physics classes attend an engineering presentation.

### SCHOOL TO COMMUNITY

- Elementary and high school classes frequently visit Lyon Manor and Rock Rapids Health Centre for seasonal activities, musical events, or monthly special friends.
- Service-learning, FFA, and elementary classes assist in spring clean-up in Doon and Rock Rapids.
- Classes or groups monthly attend and perform for Rock Rapids Dinner Date, community celebrations, and organizations.
- The FFA annually assist Natural Resources and Conservation Services with loading and unloading trees.
- The FFA is responsible for manure removal and the setting up /taking down curtains in the commercial exhibit hall during the Lyon Country Fair.

- Work study students work with community mentors daily.
