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Professional Development

The Central Lyon professional staff recently completed the first of its staff development days and also completed the planning for the use of the remaining days that have been scheduled for in-service during the 2004-2005 school year. The district set aside eight days in the school calendar for professional development, five of which are during the school year when the students stay home and the teachers become students. The professional staff members take this investment of time and money very seriously. In an article by Peter Negroni in the October 2003 *School Administrator*, he states that, according to many studies, the investment in a teacher's education is the most productive for schools in terms of improved student achievement, exceeding other variables such as class size, teacher experience, or salary increases. "Teachers

who engaged in sustained, collaborative professional development around specific concerns in their curriculum were more likely to change their teaching practice in ways associated with greater student achievement, even after taking student and school conditions into account..."

During our staff development day on October 4, time was used to prepare for a site visit from the Iowa Department of Education, to complete an item analysis of our most recent Iowa Tests of Educational Development scores, to explore topics for staff development for the remainder of the school year, and to hear an update on technology. Three future in-service days will allow for the study of Marzano's *Classroom Instruction That Works*. Other time during this school year will be used to study *Seven Traits of Writing*.

Sports Complex Gets New Sign

Last year the football field (formerly *A.O. Voogd Field*) was renamed *Dick Null Field* and the new complex is now known as the *A.O. Voogd Sports Complex*.

On Tuesday, September 7, Central Lyon Athletic Director El Don Maxwell and several community volunteers erected a new sign on the football field. Tami Hoppe constructed and painted the sign. Volunteers were Ron Boogerd, Don Hoppe, Jeff Schram, Dave Schleusner, Loren Top, and Larry Wibben.

Secondary Thoughts

I was among some adults the other day, when one of them told a story of how he had been to a store, had given the teenage cashier a twenty dollar bill in payment for some items, and then received the incorrect change in return. This of course ignited a lively conversation by the rest of the group on how “today’s kids just don’t know the basics like making the correct change.” This was followed by the pointed question to me – “Don’t you teach things like that at school anymore?” and an even livelier conversation broke out on how scary the future is going to be when the “kids of today” become adults.

Well, the answer to the question of whether we teach the basics is a resounding “Yes we do!”

Along with the basics of reading, writing, and arithmetic, we also teach about character, responsibility, science, computer skills, history, government, psychology, all the vocational arts, music education, physical education, sex education, driver education, etc., etc., etc. We take great pride in knowing that our curriculum flows from one grade to the next without gaps or redundancies, and that the topics we are teaching are relevant and useful today and in the future. I personally have four children in this school system, and you can be assured, we are teaching what we ought to be teaching!

One point from the opening paragraph I do wish to make, however. Yes, unfortunately today’s kids will make mistakes in giving correct change, and they will make mistakes in their use of oral and written language, and yes, they will even make mistakes in judgment sometimes, but that’s what kids do. One thing I have learned from being in education is that no matter how adamant I am as a teacher about a topic, it will only become important to the kids at the time when the skill (making correct change, balancing check-books, or writing a perfect article) becomes important to them. Sometimes that doesn’t happen until adulthood. By then, there will be a new generation of “kids unable to make change.”

The **ACT** test is primarily designed for students who plan to attend a four-year college. It is usually used as part of the college admission requirements.



FFA Coop

Last April, fifteen Central Lyon FFA members became involved with an investment opportunity which included the FFA and its farm just north of Rock Rapids. They became active members of what is now known as the Central Lyon FFA Coop. To join the coop, a member must meet the following criteria:

1. Be an active Central Lyon FFA member.
2. Have parental permission.
3. Agree to a share of the workload.
4. Pay \$150 per membership.
(6 memberships per person maximum)
5. Other criteria too numerous to mention.

The first project consisted of nine calves, which started at 388 lbs. and sold at 800 lbs. With the completion of our first project, the \$150 membership is now worth \$165.21, an increase of \$15.21 since April 2004. The overall Central Lyon FFA chapter is supporting the coop in its beginning stages, both financially and otherwise. The coop members can't lose any of their original investment, plus it will draw a minimal interest rate for them. Members must maintain their investment for a minimum of one year and can remain a member for three years past graduation, keeping in mind that they must share equally in the workload. Workload might consist of daily chores, manure clean up, fencing, etc.

The coop has begun a new project involving fifteen 294 lb. calves located on the FFA farm north of Rock Rapids. There are currently 44 memberships from 20 FFA members, and more of both are expected before October 15 (the deadline for involvement in this project).

At this point, we are planning several different projects on our FFA farm. These projects are primarily aimed at improving the eye appeal of the property. These improvements include

- Burning and removal of the old building structure.
- Putting in a permanent gate at the north entrance.
- Landscaping the north entrance with a white fence, a sign, a rock garden, and a couple of trees.

Our new officer team, led by our president Drew DeGroot, has also set a goal of starting an associate membership program with the coop. As you can probably tell by now, this is an exciting venture for our FFA members.

On Monday, Nov. 1, at 7:00 pm there will be a financial aid meeting for parents in the high school vocal music room. This meeting should be especially helpful to parents of seniors and juniors. It will be beneficial to parents who have not been through the financial aid process before.

The meeting will focus on the financial aid process, including a detailed discussion of the FAFSA, and an overview of the state and federal financial aid programs. It will be conducted by the College Planning Center of Des Moines. The College Planning Center is a division of Iowa Student Loan Liquidity Corporation, a private, not-for-profit corporation. The center provides FREE information, assistance, counseling and support to college-bound students and their families as they plan for college and apply for financial aid. Note to Parents of Seniors

Throughout the year, the guidance office will be giving various handouts—magazines, brochures, and pamphlets—to the students. Much of the information given to them will be related to post-secondary schools, financial aid, or careers. Please ask your sons/daughters on occasion if they have received any information which might be of interest to you. Please do not hesitate to call with any questions you may have.

New Success Coordinator

I would like to introduce myself to all the parents; my name is Toby Lorenzen and I am the Success Coordinator at Central Lyon this year. Most of you know me as Coach Lorenzen, your child's physical education teacher. I now teach K-3 Physical Education and have expanded my duties working in the guidance office half days.

The first few weeks of school have been very exciting for me. I have been able to get into the classrooms and talk to the K-2-4 grades about topics like feelings and why each person is important in his/her own way. My job description ranges from working with new students making their transition easier, checking on academic progress of students, working in the elementary classrooms, and spending some quality time talking and dealing with kids who are struggling with feelings or having problems in school.

Freshmen Conferences

If you are the parent/guardian of a high school freshman, please plan to come to the guidance office to meet with your child/student and the guidance counselor to develop a four year plan of study. These meetings are by appointment and will be held from October 26 to November 24.

PLAN or PSAT?

Several students have indicated an interest in taking the PLAN or PSAT test. Each student who indicated an interest was given a guide/bulletin to help him/her better understand the test and was encouraged to share this with parents. Letters were also sent to the parents of these students. These tests give the student more exposure into what a college entrance exam (ACT or SAT) is all about.

The PLAN test will be given at Central Lyon to interested sophomores on Saturday, Oct. 23, at 8:45 a.m. The PLAN is actually a preliminary ACT, developed by the American College Testing program, who also makes the ACT.

The PSAT test will be offered to interested juniors on Saturday, Oct. 16, at 8:45 a.m. The PSAT is actually a preliminary SAT, developed by the College Board who also makes the SAT. The PSAT exam is also connected with the National Merit Scholarship Corporation which will offer scholarships to some of the top scoring students throughout the U.S. Some colleges will also offer scholarships to high scoring PSAT test takers.

Historical Plaza Committee Report

The Historical Plaza is under construction on the site of the flagpole near the new Activities Center. It is hoped that the current phase of the Plaza will be completed this fall and will be on display for the public to enjoy. Expenditures for this phase have been met with the purchases of benches, pavers, and bricks, donations, and volunteer work.

To expand the vision for the plaza, the Historical Plaza Committee will continue to raise the funds needed to complete future phases of the project, including an entrance archway constructed with limestone door surrounds and a back wall which will display limestone quotes, all salvaged from the former high school. An additional \$12,500 is needed to complete the final two phases of the project and provide for other costs that may arise. The estimate for

the placement of the limestone door surround is \$8,165, and the estimate for the back wall is \$3,650. As the funds become available, these phases will be completed.


