The Central Lyon Historical Plaza

During the summer of 2003 the former high school building, also known as Wilson High, was demolished in order to prepare the site for the construction of a new facility to support the activities to be conducted in the remaining gymnasium, weight room, and fitness center. Prior to the demolition of the vacant building, certain artifacts were salvaged from the 1923 structure. It is our intent that they will be used in the construction of a historical area near the flagpole, which stands at the south end of Boone Street and had been dedicated by the class of 1924. The salvaged pieces include decorative urns from the roof line, two limestone plaques featuring quotations from Whitman and Macy, two ornate limestone door surrounds from the entrances, and a plaque of dedication for former Superintendent Wynant S. Wilson. All the salvaged pieces will be incorporated into the construction of the historical plaza.

To fund the historical plaza, a citizens committee has launched a campaign to sell engraved bricks and granite pavers that will make up the floor of the plaza. Enclosed in this newsletter is an insert which gives details of the project and includes an order form for the purchase of engraved bricks, granite pavers, and granite benches. An art-

ist's depiction of what the historical plaza might look like is shown at right.

Construction of the plaza is planned to begin during the spring or summer of 2004, although it will be a continuing process as anticipated funds are gathered. Please direct questions to Marla Freese at the Central Lyon Community School, P.O. Box 471, Rock Rapids, IA, 51246, phone 712-472-2664.

Did you know.....

- The first school built in Rock Rapids was constructed in the late 1870's and the first graduation was in 1884.
- In 1922, Spencer Construction was awarded the contract of \$134,108 to build Wilson High School, which was named after Superintendent Wynant S. Wilson.
- The class of 1924 (17 students) was the first class to graduate from the Wilson High School building.
- In 1959, the Rock Rapids Independent School District became the Central Lyon Community School District as a result of a merger with the Doon Public School.
- The elementary and middle school classes moved into the current elementary building in January, 1968.
- The class of 1999 was the first class to graduate from the current high school building.

What is the Central Lyon School Foundation, Inc.?

Irradiated Food Products

Ensuring the nutritional quality and safety of meals served to children participating in the National School lunch Program continues to be a top priority for the Department of Agriculture (USDA). As part of the 2002 Farm Bill, congress directed the USDA to permit the use of approved food safety technology for food purchased for the National School Lunch Program. This includes irradiation. We wish to take a moment to explain how this Congressional directive is being implemented, and how it affects your food service.

Beginning January 2004, the USDA will offer commodity irradiated ground beef as a choice, along with nonirradiated ground beef, for delivery to schools. Iowa, along with other states, will be sent irradiated product only if is ordered by the school. At this time, the Central Lyon Community School plans to order irradiated products only when the non-irradiated products are not available.

Keloland By Don Liefeld, Technology Con Weather Net Site

Last spring Central Lyon Elementary/Middle School principal, Lance Olson, completed an application to become a Keloland Weather Net site. KELO TV provides the monitoring equipment and the school installs, monitors and maintains the equipment. Central Lyon Middle School received approval as a weather net site late last spring and received the necessary equipment. Our data gathering sensors are mounted about 8 feet above the building on the west end of the middle school wing. The data is collected and, about every 5 minutes, sent to KELO TV.

We hope the residents of the school district will enjoy seeing up to the minute weather information and it will be a valuable tool for teaching students about the weather.

Food irradiation is a process in which products are exposed to radiant energy including gamma rays, electron beams, and x-rays in amounts approved by the by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). Irradiation is only one of many processes that can be used to prevent foodborne illness. It is not a substitute for good manufacturing practices. Establishments that use irradiation must meet the same sanitation and processing standards required by all meat and poultry plants.

Food is irradiated to make it safer. It can reduce the risk of foodborne illness by destroying harmful bacteria, parasites, insects, and fungi. Irradiation does not destroy all pathogens in amounts approved by the FDA for refrigerated or frozen raw meat and poultry sold to consumers, but it does reduce their number. To sterilize food, a higher amount of radiation must be used. Hospitals have used irradiation for many years to sterilize food for cancer patients and others with weakened immune systems. Irradiation also reduces spoilage. Like freezing, canning, and drying, irradiation can also extend the shelf life of perishable food products. For example, irradiated strawberries stay unspoiled in the refrigerator up to 3 weeks versus only 3 to 5 days for untreated berries.

The U.S. Government and Congress support irradiation as a food safety technology that can assist schools in providing safe meals to children. However, there are a number of other organizations that have information and perspectives to offer on this issue, some of which may even argue against irradiation.
